

Lucy Maud Montgomery



Lucy Maud Montgomery was born on November 30, 1874 in Clifton (now New London) on Prince Edward Island. When she was two, her mother died and her father remarried and left, leaving exposed Lucy in the care of grandparents living on the farm in Cavendish. The girl was brought up harshly and grew up in an atmosphere of strict discipline, which is why she gladly escaped in the world of books. She also began to write herself. Her first "work" was published in a large newspaper - she was fifteen at the time. In 1895 Lucy Maud Montgomery completed her teaching in the Prince of Wales. In 1911 she married and

gave birth to three sons. In 1935 she left with her husband for Toronto. Lucy Maud Montgomery died on April 24, 1942 in Toronto.

Green Hill is nothing but one of the farms located on Prince Edward Island in Avonlea, Canada. It belongs to the older siblings of the Cuthbert family - Maryla and Mateusz. This childless couple decided that they would take a boy from the orphanage so that he would be able to help them in their daily duties and young enough to be brought up properly. On an agreed day, Mateusz sets off for Bright River, from where he was supposed to pick up a small orphan from the station. To his surprise, a small redhead and a terribly looking girl were waiting for him. This is Ania Shirley. He couldn't leave her alone on the platform, so he decided to take her home and let Maryla wonder what to do now. They wanted a boy ... there must have been some terrible mistake. His sister initially intended to give the girl back to the shelter, or to help another family. However, after hearing the sad story of Ania and the pleas of Mateusz, it was decided to let the orphan live with them on the Green Hill. What will happen to the eleven-year-old girl? Will it manage to acclimatize in a new place? Who will she meet interesting and what adventures await her?
