Poznań

Stary Rynek is one of the most interesting and most visited places in Poznań. In the mid-13th century, Duke Przemysław I began building a new Poznań. This designated - 20 hectare area of the city did not increase until 1800. In the city center there was a market square, which constituted 10% of the city's area. Today's Old Market Square and its surroundings are a typical example of a medieval Polish city. The square with the town hall, pillory, palaces, tenement houses, wells and city scales attracts crowds of tourists. The main attraction of the Old Market is goats, which appear only once a day at 12.00.
